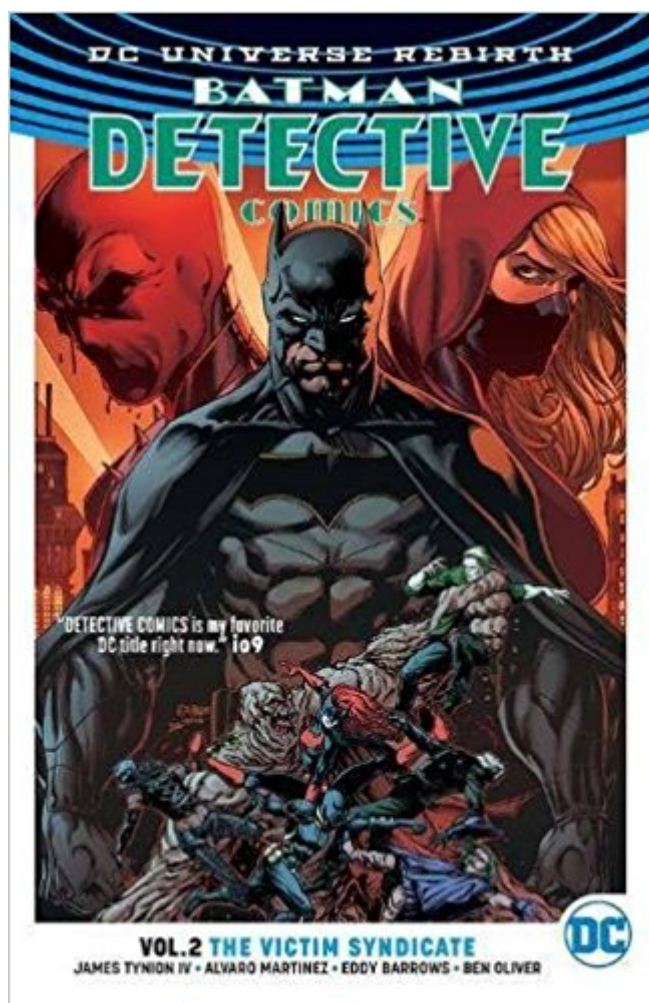


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Batman: Detective Comics Vol. 2: The Victim Syndicate (Rebirth)

James Tynion IV started in the comics business assisting Scott Snyder in writing backup stories for

Snyder's groundbreaking BATMAN series. Tynion soon began writing TALON a series that spun out of the hugely popular "Batman: The Court of Owls" storyline. He has also written CONSTANTINE: THE HELLBLAZER and RED HOOD AND THE OUTLAWS.

The second volume of the new Detective Comics run features some decent villains and a dramatic battle between Batwoman's team and their own personal demons. After the apparent death of Tim Drake (who has been stolen away by the mysterious Mr. Oz), the team put together by Batman and Batwoman are left reeling. At this fragile moment a new group of villains called the Victim Syndicate appear on the scene and start attacking Gotham, demanding that Batman stand down and unmask himself publicly. The Victim Syndicate is actually composed of bystanders who were caught up in various accidents and battles between Batman and his various rogues with each of the Victims gaining powers from their tormentors. Seeing his past failures directly in front of him places a toll on Batman, as well as on Clayface (one of the Victims is an old friend of his whom he nearly murdered). Again, the reformed villain is one of the best parts of the book and seeing Clayface struggle with his past misdeeds is a great character moment. The other standout of the book is Spoiler: Stephanie Brown. Tim's girlfriend, Spoiler is devastated by his death and starts to believe that the Victim Syndicate may in fact be right about Batman causing more problems than he fixes. Good read overall, though the leader of the Victims falls a bit flat due to their "mysterious" nature and origin (comic books and comic book TV shows are relying on dramatic reveals for villains too much recently). Also, the book retreads ground other Batman stories (especially the video game Arkham City) have already covered with the question of whether or not Batman creates his rogues just by existing.

The first book of Rebirth's Detective Comics was one of my favorites in the revamp, so ordering volume 2 was a no-brainer. And once again, this book is holding strong. The Victim Syndicate follows pretty directly from the emotional impact of the events in volume 1, with the characters still very clearly trying to cope. Being Gotham City, of course, they hardly get the chance, as a new villain team pops up, and chaos ensues. The villain team is very interesting, especially just how grotesque the Victim Syndicate appears. Tynion manages to balance this aspect quite well for both horror and tragedy, making you feel sympathy for the bad guys while still seeing how clearly they have crossed a line. The focus on our hero team is slightly shifted around as well. One of my few nitpicks with the first book was a relative lack of attention on Spoiler, which this book very quickly picks up the slack on. Stephanie Brown gets most of the new focus here, and it all feels justified

within the context of the story. Clayface also gets more character-building, and is presented in such a way that I don't think I'll be able to see him as a true "villain" in other works because of the way it is handled. It's very well-done. New faces to this series Batwing and Harper Rowe serve a little more as supporting characters, especially to Batwoman and Stephanie, respectively, and Azrael continues to get brief but memorable moments, leading me to suspect he will be important down the road. Batwoman, this time around, has her own sub-plot, but within the Victim Syndicate plot, is not quite as central as the first arc; however, the last couple of chapters in the book focus primarily on her, so she isn't getting the short end of the stick. The big thing is simply just how very well-done this all is. Even the less-used characters feel important to the plot. The emotion that carries the book is genuine. The philosophical ideas tossed around are key to the proceedings instead of just window dressing, like some superhero stories tend to do. Simply, this book is a finely-tuned machine. You need to read this series.

Good follow up to vol 1 rise of the batmen. The other two Batman series of DC rebirth....Batman and All Star Batman are both good but Imo this is the best series of the three. I prob mentioned it in my review of D Tec' vol 1 but I love how Tynion IV handles each vigilante in Batman's group. Every bat-kick has their own personality. Their dialogue fits their character perfectly imo. Good story and art. Deff like the change of pace in the artwork. The first 5 issues cover the victim syndicate storyline. The last two is a 2 parter titled Batwomans begins. Highly recommended this
