


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Fall Of Poppies: Stories Of Love And The Great War

I suppose I may have been expecting quite a bit from this collection of stories, considering the wonderful authors who wrote them. But as I read them I realized no characters were jumping out at me. So I read it again and felt the same way. Many readers will love this book but it just didn't grab me. Beatriz Williams's story was a bold experiment for her, so unlike her other work. I admire the fact that she took a risk, though I didn't enjoy the story in any way. Jennifer Robson's story was delightful, but a little too thin for my taste. I want to hear more -- a lot more -- about her characters. As for the book design, it is gorgeous with the deep reds, and the texture of the cover makes me want to keep holding the book even after I'm done reading.

I cannot choose a favorite story among these gems of truth, feeling, and memory. I believe WWI

continues today; it is our Hundred Years War. Told mostly from a woman's viewpoint, these short stories reveal the thoughts & feelings of the "survivors" who birthed, raised, loved or loved some other woman's child caught up in the disaster of war. One hundred years later, the madness continues.

Most of these stories are rather unbelievable, too much reliance on coincidence to provide a positive/upbeat ending. The idea of using the WWI armistice as a theme is a good one, but the execution is mostly weak. There are two stories that were standouts for me, "Hush" by Hazel Gaynor and "All for the Love of You" by Jennifer Robson.

Every once in a while, I like to leave my "romance genre" comfort zone and read something a different. Fall Of The Poppies is an interesting collection of short stories, all set around the end of World War One in 1918. Here are my three favourite stories from this historical anthology:

- A moving story about a single mum. The Daughter of Belgium by Marco Jefferson
- Amelie has lived within the confines of the Cavell Institute in Brussels for three years. Now it is time to move all the patients into another building. Amelie is informed she is to stay behind and use the training she has gained during her time at the institute to look after the only patient who isn't moving too.
- Lars Ludvig is not who Amelie thinks he is and finds out they have much more in common than she ever dreamed.
- Betrayal. Something Worth Landing For by Jessica Brockmole
- A beautiful story of an artist who develops feelings for an injured American serviceman who is being fitted for a mask to cover his facial disfigurement. He then goes back to his home, after been told tragic news about the beautiful young lady who helped him. Years later the woman finds out that the serviceman was told of her death, so she actively tries to track him down.
- Compassion and hope. All For the Love of You by Jennifer Robson
- A young pregnant woman who is and about to lose her job and home meets a pilot who offers to marry her on a whim. He tells her she can claim Widows benefit if he dies. Neither would have guessed that during the time they wait to become legally married, they both are falling in love with each other.
- All the contributing authors are new to me. Each has their own individual style, covering vastly different plot-lines but all share the poignancy of the Great War. The austerity of the era is highlighted, yet, there is an abundance of hope for the protagonists. As a reader, I love any story that leaves me to ponder about what happens next and there is plenty to think and wonder about within these short stories.

Fall of Poppies is a stunning anthology written by some of my favorite authors of historical fiction. Each story takes place during WWI, and they are all full of emotions; love, sorrow, loss and a hope for the future. The stories are all as distinctive as the authors who wrote them, and the characters in them are complex and interesting. I encourage all fans of historical fiction to read these wonderful short stories.

This anthology of short stories is held together by the common theme of love and the end of WWI. Each story has its own unforgettable characters, from the young rape victim in hiding, to the show girl to the grieving mother I was enthralled by them all.
