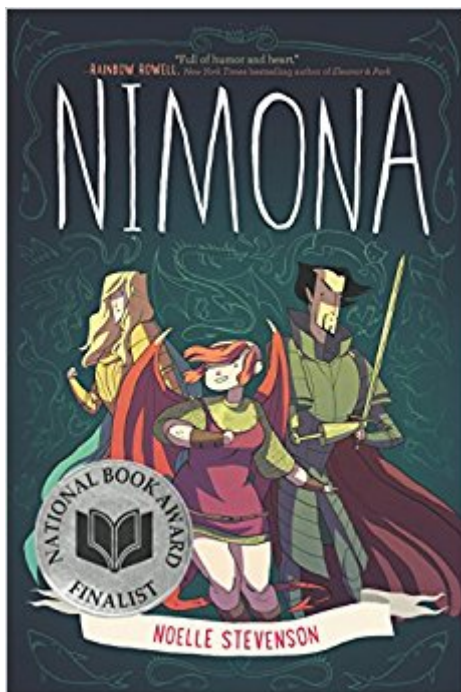


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Nimona

And her unpredictable wild side might be more dangerous than he is willing to admit.

Gr 7 Up • This celebrated webcomic, a mash-up of medieval culture with modern science and technology, is now available in print. Lord Ballister Blackheart, a knight, has assumed the role of a supervillain in order to expose the nefarious schemes of the kingdom's front organization, The Institute of Law Enforcement. The kingdom's champion is Lord Blackheart's nemesis and former best friend, Sir Ambrose Goldenloin. Blackheart's prickly relationship with Goldenloin further explores the limits of their friendship. Enter the title character, a brash young shapeshifter who doggedly follows Ballister until he agrees to take her on as a sidekick. Nimona's skills as a shapeshifter up the ante in the ongoing rivalry between Ambrose and Ballister. Despite her anger management issues, the teen becomes Ballister's invaluable ally and together they form an alliance of mutual trust and dependence. Action scenes dominate as Nimona shifts with Hulk-like ferocity from frightful creatures such as a fire-breathing dragon to a docile cat or a timid child. Dialogue is fresh and witty with an abundance of clever lines. A complementary color palette of Blackheart's muddy browns contrasts with Goldenloin's fresh transparent yellow-greens. Both color schemes highlight Nimona's intense reds. Readers will note subtle visual differences in webcomic images. The print edition includes an exclusive epilogue not available online. The story is 5 stars. I have been following this comic since it was posted online and it’s an amazing rollercoaster of emotions. However the print copy arrived looking beat up. It’s not anything that dampens my enjoyment of the story, but it’s still disappointing. I thoroughly recommend getting a copy of this book since it’s no longer online to read. It’s a full story with extra pages that weren’t published online. The art is gorgeous and the cover is amazing. It’s a great deal for the price. The story starts with the kingdom’s most infamous villain getting a super-powered sidekick. Except that he never requested one, and no one is really sure where she came from. I don’t want to spoil too much since it’s a short story when read cover to cover. If you’re a fan of strong (in the physical sense) female antiheroes then this is the comic for you.

I finished just Nimona. It may be one of the best stories I’ve ever read. I’m not gonna say best comic book because I think it stands up to novels just as well as it does to other comic books. It’s got really likable, well written and thought out characters. The plot is great! It’s funny, but serious. There’s a solid ending on it that feels hopeful and realistic, completely fitting the story. The world is amazingly well built. The art is a great fit for the story, being appealingly funny when the story is funny and creepily dark when the story calls for bad things to happen. I love Ballister, Ambrosius, and Nimona. The story is one of my favorites from here on out.

But as much as I could wish for a longer series, I feel like it might risk sacrificing a lot of the stuff that made me love this book. So I’m really happy it’s the way it is, and I know I’ll keep revisiting and thinking

about these characters in my head for a while hopefully :)Also just as an aside the art was totally beautiful and the way some really intense scenes were conveyed (like transformation sequences and big plot scenes) was really terrific and I got a great sense for how the characters acted and moved and how that related to who they were.

Stevenson's *Nimona*, a National Book Award Finalist, mixes fantasy and sci-fi, with fairy tale/medieval elements of knights and monsters, witches and goblins, superheroes and villains in a world of television, science, and technology. Enter Nimona, a shapeshifting teen with a penchant for fighting and killer sense of humor. Nimona is the sidekick, her boss, Lord Ballister Blackheart, is the archvillain with a moral sense of right and wrong. Nimona urges us to question authority, to trust ourselves and those that we love and to remember that often we can create our own families, and to question what makes a hero, what defines a villain.

Stevenson's art is crisp, simple, with bold colors and thick lines and the text in each frame is minimal so much of the meaning in the story comes from these images.

I just received my copy of *Nimona* in the mail earlier tonight and have already devoured it in its entirety. It's not what I expected, but in all of the best ways. For some background, my recent avalanche of purchases of girl-centric comics was inspired by the Kickstarter for the anthology, *Valor*. *Valor* is, in short, amazing. The idea was to get together a bunch of comics and stories written by women featuring diverse girls kicking butt. And in that aspect, it succeeded wonderfully. However, due to the short nature of the pieces, it's hard to really develop a story. So I went seeking other fun girl power stories to share with the children (and adults, because comics are awesome) in my life. I couldn't be happier with *Nimona*. First of all, the entire story is contained in this hefty (at least for a comic/graphic novel) volume. There is enough story to really get a feel for the characters and their individual struggles, as well as the world that they live in. Nimona is not your typical protagonist. She's cheeky and likes to annoy her boss and often throws herself into bad situations for the fun of it. She has dark secrets and often makes the wrong decisions. She isn't concerned with the "rules" of being a villain. Her dialogue with Blackheart (and really all of the dialogue) is snappy and goofy and had me laughing out loud. The whole story is both hilarious and touching, even heartrending at times. So as an adult, definitely a must buy. For kids, I'd leave that to parent discretion. **WARNINGS:** *Nimona* is a smart story that doesn't pull punches. The characters are flawed individuals, and when the protagonists are villains, that often means that someone gets killed. There is also a certain running gag with names of heroes, particularly Sir Goldenloin and Sir

Girthrod, and one joking news story about whether Sir Goldenloin's codpiece is overcompensation.
