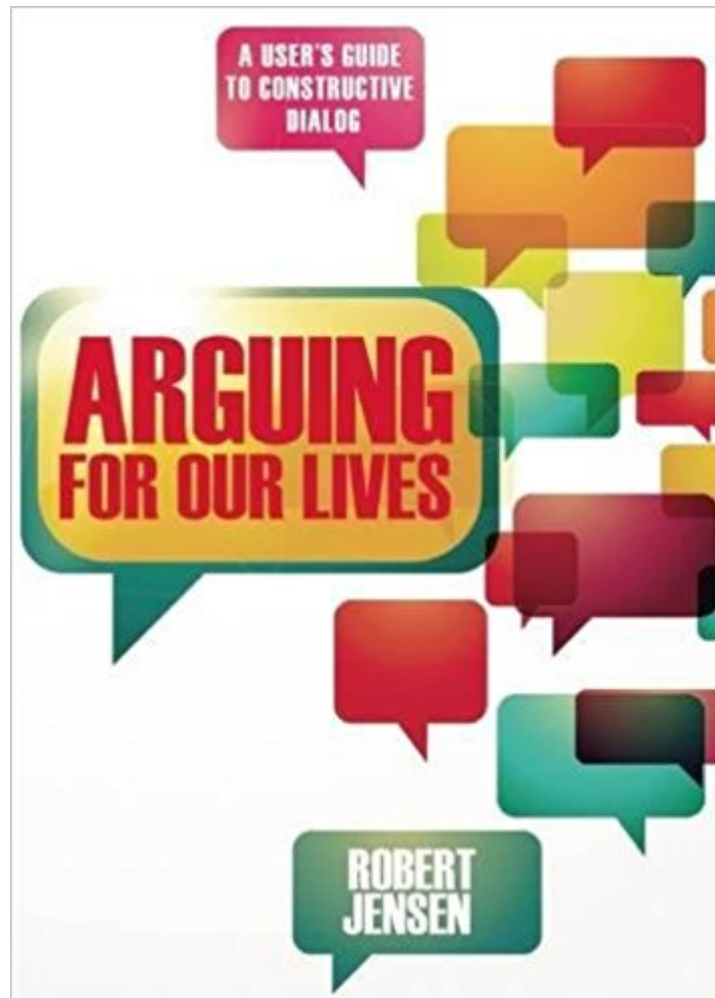


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# Arguing For Our Lives: A User's Guide To Constructive Dialog



## Synopsis

We live in a time when public discourse is more skewed than ever by the propaganda that big money can buy, with trust in the leadership of elected officials at an all-time low. The "news" has degenerated into sensationalist sound bites, and the idea of debate has become a polarized shouting match that precludes any meaningful discussion. It's also a time of anxiety, as we're faced with economic and ecological crises on a global scale, with stakes that seem higher than ever before. In times like these, it's essential that we be able to think and communicate clearly. In this lively primer on critical thinking, Robert Jensen attacks the problems head on and delivers an accessible and engaging book that explains how we can work collectively to enrich our intellectual lives. Drawing on more than two decades of classroom experience and community organizing, Jensen shares strategies on how to challenge "conventional wisdom" in order to courageously confront the crises of our times and offers a framework for channeling our fears and frustrations into productive analysis that can inform constructive action. Jensen connects abstract ideas with the everyday political and spiritual struggles of ordinary people. Free of either academic or political jargon, this book is for anyone struggling to understand our world and contribute to making it a better place. 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Jensen offers clear frameworks for engaging in constructive dialog about the issues that matter. It's not about shouting matches, or "That's just my opinion." or "America, love it or leave it." In a clear accessible manner, he explains how to note and defend your assumptions, clearly define what you mean by your terms, and offer evidence and reasoning to support your opinions. He discusses approaching questions ecologically, societally and personally and attempting to understand our world philosophically, historically and sociologically. He includes chapters about thinking critically about politics, religion and news media. He introduces Abe Osheroff, a political organizer going back to the 1930s who died in 2008. Osheroff made the point that though we all have greed as part of our core, it is in our self-interest to pursue a path of generosity, love, and affection.

Jensen advocates civil discourse about controversial issues. The standard prescription for first date and dinner party conversation has always been "No religion and no politics." Jensen wants us to have more conversations about religion, politics, the news media, and the environment. He provides

lots of advice for having good conversations about such things, common sense advice that is also informed by research. He does not pretend to have the answers to the multiple crises we face, but argues that we are not likely to find any answers if we do not engage in more frequent, serious conversations about them. I am a sociology teacher, and have found a wealth of good ideas for improving the quality of the discussions we have in my classes. But I recommend the book to anyone interested in getting beyond talking only about the weather, sports, movies, TV programs, and the follies of their absent neighbors.

Jensen moves beyond the abstract and applies critical thinking skills and theories to major concerns in today's world.
