THE THEMATIC COMPONENTS OF HUMAN DEVELOPMENT RESEARCH

- Cross-National and Longitudinal Studies:** The same individuals are studied over a prolonged interval (longitudinal study). Individuals are studied over diverse (cross-national).
- Qualitative and Quantitative:** Qualitative may be instrumental and focus on activities (e.g., family, work) and how these relate (qualitative, e.g., patients or clients).
- Genetic and Environmental:** The interaction between genetic and environmental factors is a complex one, expressed in different interactive routes for different developmental modalities.
- Contextual:** Contextual influences may be context-dependent, for instance, family environment, culture and historical periods. Other factors may play a more dominant role in personality development in a particular culture or a historical period in a culture.
- Consistency Effect:** Many developmental influences are best understood as the interaction of multiple factors.
- Maturational/Physical:** The internal changes in the longevity of populations, birth control and earlier development, the actual age and stage of developmental skills need to be incorporated as being a relevant consideration. For instance, teenagers are more likely to be engaging socially and sexually, and better general health adults in their 60s are far more active and energetic than adults of the same age in their 20s.
- Context of Childhood:** The experimental and applied validity of most theories of development cannot be clearly established due to unique circumstances, it would be greatly misleading to assume randomly assigned groups of newborn infants to completely observe an intervention until treated as a class of training process here such factors especially impact on personality development.

THEORIES OF DEVELOPMENT

- Personality Theories:** The role of subpersonal factors in personality development. Sigmund Freud, Carl Jung, Alfred Adler and Karen Horney are representative of this tradition.
- Personism:** A value or professionalistic approach, wherein school and organization development is thought to be the main contribution to development. Sigmund Freud and William James are representative of this tradition.

INFANCY & TODDLERHOOD (AGE 0-3 YEARS)

PHYSICAL & COGNITIVE DEVELOPMENT

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

- Spontaneous and preprogrammed functions, initial sensory capabilities (sight, touch, hearing, taste, smell), perception, locomotion, locomotion are limited but develop rapidly.

COGNITIVE DEVELOPMENT

- Emergent cognitive abilities, reduction of causal influences (first categorization, learning, enculturation and language play).
- Problem Solving: An individual's ability to systematically investigate cognitive development and solve the second-order tasks.

SOCIAL & PERSONALITY DEVELOPMENT

- Trust vs. Mistrust: If child's needs are adequately met, a sense of trust is developed; if not, mistrust may develop.
- Attachment: May be secure, attachment, ambivalent, disorganized/avoidant. There is a strong relationship between attachment and child's academic success and a child's attachment status has long-term consequences extending into adulthood.
- Separation Anxiety: Most pronounced between 12 and 18 months.

THE DEVELOPMENT OF LANGUAGE & COMMUNICATION SKILLS

- Language development: By infants is by means of food gestures, crying and gesturing.
- Vocalization of infants begins around 7 months; vocalization expands rapidly at 12 months.
- The rapid and organized expansion of parent language expression results in the child's language abilities.

* Object permanence is related to the development of thinking and the cognitive theory. If the mother leaves the room, infants may believe they recognize that the mother will return.
